(CETA program)

BIOGRAPHICAL DATA  
LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR JEAN KING

Born in Honolulu, Lieutenant Governor Jean King is the eldest child of Chiyo Murakami of Kona and William McKillop, a Canadian Scot who came to Hawaii in the 1920's to be the first postmaster of Captain Cook, on the Big Island. She is the mother of two children - a son and a daughter.

Jean attended Likelike and Aliiolani Elementary Schools, then Sacred Hearts Academy where in her senior year she was editor of the school annual and class valedictorian.

Jean then went on to the University of Hawaii, obtaining her Bachelor of Arts in English literature. She subsequently earned from New York University a Master's degree in U.S. History, then a Master of Fine Arts at the University of Hawaii in Drama and Theatre. Reflecting her early concern for people and their welfare, the topic of her Master's thesis in history was the 1946 Hawaii sugar strike which began a major change in the social and economic scene in the Islands. For her Master's thesis in Drama, she produced and directed the world premiere in English of a contemporary Japanese anti-war play, "The Pilot" by Miyamoto, Ken. Two one-act plays she has written have been put on at the University's Kennedy Laboratory Theatre.

Lieutenant Governor King, a Democrat, has served for the past four years in the State Senate representing the Sixth Senatorial District (Manoa, Waikiki, McCully, Moiliili, Makiki, Kakaako, Downtown, Tantalus). For those four years she has chaired the Senate Ecology, Environment and Recreation Committee, and served as Vice Chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee. Additionally she has served as a member of the Ways and Means Committee, Higher Education Committee, and Economic Development Committee.

Immediately prior to her election to the State Senate, she served in the House of Representatives, becoming chairman of its first Committee on Environmental Protection.

Lieutenant Governor King is a life member of the Friends of the Library and Outdoor Circle; Member, Bishop Museum Association, Honolulu Academy of Arts, Waikiki Aquarium, Hawaii Audubon Society, and Hawaii Historic Foundation.
